S. Lake Community Center Completed, Grand Opening and Celebration Held

S. LAKE - The S. Lake community center is now open.

The center, which has been a community goal for a number of years, features the following amenities; a gym, sauna, kitchen, handi-capable restrooms, and two offices. Bringing the center up to date and similar to the semi-recent Onigum community center build was a goal for staff members who worked on the project.

The center which is still undergoing updates, will receive computers in the near future, as well as fiber optic internet installed throughout the building to ensure the community will have fast and reliable internet access.

The grand opening for the center took place January 7, 2022, and featured the Nut Hill drum group, invocation by Michael Smith Sr. and a number of speeches by Tribal and State officials, followed by a shared meal in celebration.

Tribal Chairman Faron Jackson Sr. opened the celebration with a speech focused on thanking those involved with the creation of the center, and sharing why community spaces like the center are important, especially to the reservations outer communities.

"It takes teamwork to make things like this center happen. It comes through advice of the elders, the local LIC, and staff members. Having a community so far from the hub, made updating this community center a priority. Distance has always been a barrier and this center is going to be able to address a lot of the communities' needs that they've had for years," said Jackson.

LLBO Deputy Director Gordon Fineday who also spoke at the grand opening emphasized the importance of having a place to gather following the COVID-19 pandemic shutdowns.

The best thing we can do as leadership is hopefully create more opportunities for communities to gather in a safe place. In this day and age – where everyone had to stay home for two years, mental health is a priority. Getting out to a place like this, where it feels safe – is a great thing for everybody," said Fineday.

Community members looking to use the space for additional activities outside of regular use or seeking maintenance for the building are encouraged to visit the LLBO website and fill out a coordinating form.

The center is located at 59979 County Rd 4, S. Lake, MN, and is open M-F 8am-4:30pm.



Leech Lake Tribal **College Conducting** Search for **New President**

CASS LAKE - The Leech Lake Tribal College Presidential search is underway.

The college's presidential search is a tedious and time consuming process. One that the college prides itself on, as the community driven process helps narrow down potential candidates through shareholder feedback.

The succession plan, which Human Resources Director Carol White broke down, was first enacted in 2015. It begins with the posting of the colleges open position on a number of sites, immediately followed by the choosing of a selection committee and said committee narrowing down the colleges first set of applicants to a set of finalists.

The selection committee, who narrows down the first set of applicants is composed of three board of trustee members, the dean of academics, one LLTC employee, and three community members from each of the reservations districts, who are selected by their RTC district representative.

Following the selection committee's decision, all remaining candidates will present their five-year plan to the college's staff, students and community members. All those present at the public presentations are asked to fill out a survey on their opinions of each candidate which are forwarded to the LLTC board of trustees, who then will do the college's final round of interviews based on community feedback and the college's needs.

Give 2 The Max 2021, LLTC Donation Drive

The Leech Lake Tribal College exceeded it's donation goals set for 2021, surpassing funds raised in the previous year

CASS LAKE – Leech Lake Tribal College exceeded it's donation goal during 2021's Give to the Max day.

Give to the Max Day is one of Minnesota's and LLTC's biggest days of online giving. Every year in November, GiveMN hosts thousands of organizations raising money online to improve the quality of life in Minnesota. In 2021, 6,457 nonprofits and educational institutions raised 34.3 million dollars total in 24 hours during Give to the Max day. LLTC themselves raised \$120,923, placing them in the top 10 most donated to educational institutions within the state.

The college nearly doubled their donations from the previous year, thanks in part to a \$15,000 LLBO gaming match donation, as well as the Blandin foundation \$60,000 match donation. The college held a number of events on campus to garner donations such as the pick a prize raffle, a silent auction and the LLTC Laker's basketball taco sale. The taco sale remained one of the college's biggest event turnouts, similar to years prior, selling out within an hour and a half.

LLTC Multimedia & Marketing Specialist Ryan White who oversees the event, said none of the goals they obtained would be possible without the help of the staff behind the scenes and those who donated raffle/auction items or provided monetary assistance.

"I just want to thank all of our staff who help out with this event every year and get everything together. The donations mean a lot to the college and help us achieve our goals," said White.

Bemidji Miikinaan Gallery Featured Artist : David Ben White

BEMIDJI – The Bemidji Watermark Art Center has a new exhibit in the Miikinaan Gallery.

The Miikinaan Gallery which is home to the center's Traditional art exhibits is now displaying "Indigenous Expressions, Illustrations," By David Ben White (Oglala Lakota).

Whites collection of illustrations explores indigenous art, culture and traditions and is influenced by stories passed forward from Anishinaabe, Lakota and other tribal nations. Whites artistic styles include acrylic painting, soft chalk pastels, drawing, sketching, cartooning, wood burning and leather work. He also designs unique wearable art and creates found object displays.

White lives in Ponemah on the Red Lake Reservation. He is Oglala Lakota and an enrolled member of the Fort Peck Reservation at Wolf Point, Montana. He is a survivor of the boarding school era.

White has been an artist for a number of years and has entered pieces in various exhibitions, community art fairs and contests. He is a member of the Region 2 Anishinaabe Arts Initiative Council and a former Grantee.

He has displayed pieces at the Two Rivers Art Gallery and the Minneapolis American Indian Center in Minneapolis and locally at various art markets and expos including Region 2 events, Art From Within of the Greater Minnesota Racial Justice Project, Red Lake Nation College, Leech Lake Tribal College, and Headwaters School of Music and Arts. He has also attended various art workshops learning about art resources from the First Peoples' Fund and Springboard for the Arts.

The Indigenous Expressions exhibit will be on display at Watermark Miikinaan Gallery until February 25, 2022.

Cass Lake, Lake Winnie Fitted With New CD3 Stations Aimed to Combat AIS in Waters

In January, the LLBO Division of Resource Management Plants Department, with the help of LL Heavy Equipment, installed three new CD3 Stations located on Cass Lake and two on Lake Winnibigoshish. These stations were paid for through a state grant provided by LCCMR- lottery funds. These stations are a tool to be used in the fight against Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) that threaten our waters. All CD3 stations, including a fourth waiting to be installed, are solar powered and self-operated. Equipped with a shop vac, air blow-er, boat brushes, grabber, and plug wrench, the CD3 stations are meant to be a self-service boat cleaning station. Boaters willing to help would use the tools provided to remove all plant and animal material from their boats and trailers before moving on to their next location. Clean, Drain, Dry, Dispose for boats and other watercraft is immensely important to prevent the further spread of AIS. The DRM Plants Department also utilizes

inspectors at landings with a decontamination unit during the warmer seasons, but with Leech Lake having so many bodies of water, it is unrealistic to cover every landing and boat launch. Starry Stonewort, an AIS, has been found in Cass Lake, Lake Winnie, and Leech Lake. Although effective management of this AIS is being assessed and utilized, it is extremely important to do our best to prevent further infestations of our many other lakes and rivers within the Reservation and surrounding area. It is unclear how Starry Stonewort and other aquatic invasive species will affect our natural resources, but the DRM is determined to preemptively protect our rice, fish and water from further AIS harm.

If you suspect an Invasive Species within the Reservation, please contact the DRM Plants Department at 218-335-7400 and ask for Kate or Raining. A full list of AIS affected lakes can be provided through the DRM along with materials to help identify AIS and terrestrial invasive species found within or near the Reservation.

FCC Announces Affordable Connectivity Program, **Enrollment Now Open**

January 3, 2022 Paul Bunyan Communications announced it is working to help build awareness about the Affordable Connectivity Program, Federal а Communications Commission (FCC) program. The new longterm benefit will help to lower the cost of broadband service for eligible households struggling to afford internet service.

The \$14 billion Affordable Connectivity Program provides a discount of up to a \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligi-ble households and up to \$75 per month for qualifying households on qualifying Tribal lands. The benefit also provides up to a \$100 per household discount toward a

one-time purchase of a computer, laptop, or tablet if the household contributes more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase through a participating broadband provider.

A household is eligible if one member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Has an income that is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines:
- · Participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, SSI, WIC, or Lifeline;
- Participates in one of several Tribal specific programs, such as Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribal Head Start (only households meeting the relevant income qualifying standard) Tribal

TANF, or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations;

- Is approved to receive benefits under the free and reducedprice school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating broadband provider's existing low-income program.

Affordable Connectivity Program enrollment opened on December 31, 2021. Eligible households can enroll through a participating broadband provider or by (1) going to *ACPBenefit.org* to submit an online application or print a mail-in application and (2) contacting their preferred participating broadband provider and selecting a plan. Additional information about the Emergency Broadband Benefit is available at *www.fcc.gov/ACP*, or by calling 877-384-2575 between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. ET any day of the week.

Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe, January Quarterly Meeting

The Band recently held it's Quarterly Meeting January 14, this quarters meeting was held online via livestream

CASS LAKE – The Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe held their Quarterly Meeting virtually Friday, January 14.

Tribal Chairman Faron Jackson Sr. gave the opening remarks followed by a financial report from Secretary-Treasurer, Arthur LaRose. The report featured financial data from both government and gaming operations.

A number of resolutions concerning enrollment were passed at the meeting. These resolutions included new enrollments, ineligible enrollments, and transfers to and from the band. New employees hired in the past quarter were also introduced and welcomed at the meeting.

Last on the agenda were presentations from Division Directors in attendance on their activities over the past three months. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the event was held online through video calls. For those who were unable to watch, a livestream of the event is available on the official Leech Lake Facebook page and on LeechLakeNews.com

Quarterly Meetings are held every three months on a rotating schedule between each district on the reservation. The next Quarterly Meeting will be held in April 2022.

Quarterly Report Summaries

Tribal Court

- There were 82 new cases filed between October 1,2021 and December 31, 2021.
- The court conducted 311 hearings the past quarter.
- Chief Judge Paul Days judicial contract was renewed for another 3 years in October 2021.

Tribal Development

 Tribal Development in coordination with other divisions continues to work on the bands planning ordinance.Work with Wilder Foundation

- Work with Wilder Foundation will continue in 2022 with a secondary homeless survey being planned for October 2022.
- American Recovery Build Back Better plan currently in developmental stages with LLTC to fund developmental training on band owned property.
- A land use planning committee was formed with the intention of putting together a formal document for land use and zoning to address community issues.
- Early design model being produced for potential ball club homeless shelter .

Tribal Roads

- Womack Road project has been completed.
- Cass Lake Bike Trail is expected to be finished by summer 2022.
 Bena Bike trail expected to begin 2022.

Resource Management

- Interim director named in December to oversee Department.
- Interim Director has begun developing a strategic plan of short term and long term goals

of division that will be presented to leadership in 3^{rd} qt of FY22.

- Removal of starry stonewort invasive species in Steamboat bay occurred during reporting period.
- Installation of pollinator gardens at LLTC, Family Spirit, Palace Casino. Prescott community Center, RTC building, Jackson Village took place during the reporting period.
- Beginning phases of working on snowshoe hare habitat creation have started.

Human Services

- Change in department leadership towards end of the quarter, with an interim leader placed 12/6/21.
- October-December all childhood welfare programs were fully operational.
- The need for mental health services continue to rise as the pandemic continues. In october 2021, referrals to the LLBO Behavioral Health appointments exceeded capacity. Exceeding capacity caused a mental health service informal waiting list to be created with appointments taking 1 to 2 months to be scheduled unless

community members were in need of urgent help, in which they were referred out.

- The LLBO Behavioral Health Children Services (CTSS) successfully completed the MN DHS recertification process and was awarded a 3 year recertification.
- The LLBO Behavioral Health Crisis Response team is working with Itasca County first to call for help to contract their services. They will assist in screening and triaging mental health crisis calls for Leech Lake 24/7.
- The Cass Lake Emergency Shelter has taken in 68 singles and 12 families during this reporting period.

Education

- Education division has focused on developing the Leech Lake leadership plan to further professional development needs.
- The education administration held the first of two tribal consultations with CLB schools. They've also implemented regular meetings with WHA schools and held their first tribal consultation meeting in December. Deer River and Bemidji schools bypass Tribal Education department consultation.
- Post Secondary Education awarded 157 students during the reporting period and are still accepting new applications.
- YouthBuild program is currently being revamped to include more language and cultural components.
- Early Childhood met with LLTC to develop partnership for workforce development.
- Ojibwe Language Program has visited each of the early childhood classrooms and provided enrichment tools / lessons.
 Further field trips and events are in planning stages.
 Leech Lake Tribal College pro-
- Leech Lake Tribal College provided 570 Ojibwe flashcards,books, and games for FFN support kits.
- Snap-Ed / Diabetes Prevention Program has begun collaborating.
- Snap-Ed reestablished partnership with Boys and Girls club for youth classes.
- Community cooking courses were started during the reporting period.

Housing

 Project VIII has 30 houses set on foundations with hopes of having half the units occupied by the end of January. 24 of these units have furnaces installed and operating.

- Radon Control Technician inspected 25 radon mitigation systems and tested 5 homes for radon.
- New roofs have been installed on 15 low rent homes.
- New air exchange / recovery ventilation systems have been changed out in 37 tax credit project homes.
- Înspectors conducted 98 unit inspections during the reporting period.
- reporting period.
 The modernization department renovated 8 homes during the reporting period.

Health

- No reported outbreaks of COVID-19 at assisted living
- Health division has provided 193 clients with rides to dialysis, medical transport, and covid support.
- Family Spirit program moved into a new building during the last month of the quarter, currently becoming situated.
- Car Seat program served 37 families and provided 44 car seats during the reporting period.
- Continued reporting weekly updates to Division Directors and RTC on health matters of importance.
- 186 COVID vaccines were given during the reporting period.
- Amish Produce Distribution continued through the reporting period.
- New Tobacco Cessation program for Pregnant mothers "baby and tobacco free" to be launched 1/1/22.

Public Safety

- Program awarded 2021 "coordinated tribal assistance" funding grant for \$840,000. Grant will aid the program with cars, uniforms, equipment and methamphetamine prevention project.
- Officers continue to assist in delivering food boxes.
- Public Safety has identified potential land and funding for a veterinary clinic with hopes to break ground in 2022.
- Public safety coordinated with MNSnap / S.I.R.V.I.S. to provide animal care services including vaccination clinics during the reporting period.

Governmental Activities Secretary/Treasurer's Summary

Remarks delivered at the Quarterly Meeting on January 14, 2022

Boozhoo, everyone. I hope that everyone had a good and safe Christmas and New Year's holiday season. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to be a roller coaster ride and the number of cases has been rising in the recent months. We need to continue to keep our guard up and do what we can to continue to protect our elders, family and fellow Band Members.

This past quarter has been a very busy and exciting time for Leech Lake. Leech Lake celebrated the Grand Opening and acquisition of Leech Lake Market (formerly Teal's Market). This opportunity will assist us in achieving what Leech Lake is striving for in regards to food sovereignty. We also celebrated the Grand Opening of the newly remodeled S. Lake Community Center last week. This will provide the S. Lake Community with a beautiful and safe place for gathering. The annual Tax Rebate was distributed to all adult Band Members, the payment of \$500 was mailed out in the beginning of December. If you have not received it as of yet, please reach out to our Accounting Department.

We are currently sitting at about a \$13 million reserve in our General Fund. Our tax reimbursement amounts have remained fairconsistent throughout the Covid-19 Pandemic. Gaming revenues have rebounded after a temporary shutdown of the casinos at the beginning of the pandemic. Expenditures have been slowly growing to pre-pandemic levels now that all employees have been brought back to work as of July 1, 2021.

The Cares Act ended on December 31, 2021 and was fully expended. A breakdown on how the funding was utilized is provided at the end of this report. Management is continuing to work on a plan and budget for the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding. We will be reaching out for the Public's input in the near future in regards to these funds.

HRSA grant for \$4.17 million at the beginning of the COVID-19 Pandemic. It was initially communicated to us by the agency that there was no deadline on spending these funds. It was later communicated to us that the deadline for spending these funds was actually June 30, 2021. We had to act quickly to ensure that we didn't have to send these funds back to the agency. We ended up utilizing the HRSA funds to cover a portion of the network rebuild, the COVID homes in Cass Lake, vans for ENP and some PPE supplies. This in turn left us with unspent funds in our Cares Act program. We utilized these unspent funds from Cares Act to cover the Stimulus payments that were distributed to Band Members in August 2021.





Leech Lake Gaming Summary of Operations Quarter Ending September 2021

Revenue

From July 2021 through November 2021, Leech Lake Gaming had revenue totaling \$53.5 million. Compared to that same timeframe in FY 2021, revenue was approximately \$38 million, which is an increase of \$15.6 million. Looking at the 5-year trend, you see that revenue has made a move back to an upward trend after fiscal year 2021.

Expenses

Total expenses for Leech Lake Gaming from July 2021 through November 2021 was \$38.5 million. The previous year totaled roughly \$33.4 million, which is a \$5.2 million increase. Cost of sales accounted for much of the increase, \$3.1 million, while operating expenses increased by about \$2.2 million. Payroll expenses decreased by about \$81 thousand, not including the Premium Pay to LLG employees that was funded by ARPA funds.

Net Profit

Net profit after expenses for this period is \$15 million. This is approximately a \$10.4 million increase from fiscal year 2021. When looking at the 5-year comparison, this is rather significant increase in net profit.

Forecast

While Leech Lake Gaming has seen significant increases in revenues and profits, it is expected there will be a point where revenues and profits will no longer continue such a trend upward. Revenues are expected to start to level out or potentially decline due to the decrease in government stimulus. Expenses will be continually monitored, but with the expectation of revenue to eventually plateau or possibly return to normal levels, net profit will be proportionately affected.

The Minor's Trust activity continues to make the "18" payments. Since July 1, 2021 \$320 thousand in payments to enrolled band citizens reaching the age of 18 have been made. We allocated the annual \$250 contribution to the Minor's Trust account in December 2021. An additional \$250 was contributed to each Minor's account in August 2021. Another \$250 contribution will be made in August 2022. These allocations come out of the Band's General Fund as this is not an allowable expenditure for Cares Act or ARPA funds. Statements were mailed out for each minor in August 2021. There have been about 404 statements returned due to incorrect addresses. To ensure that these statements

are received please make sure to update addresses with the Enrollment office.

The FY22 budget is currently being developed and the Council needed to pass a continuing spending resolution in order to comply with the Band's Budget Ordinance. We are getting closer to having the budget ready to present to the Public for comment. We will distribute this information as soon as possible. We will be hosting a meeting for each District and strongly encourage as many Band Members as possible to attend and provide comments and input.

MINNESOTA COVID-19 update: JAN

MINNEAPOLIS – A number of COVID related procedures have changed within the past month.

As COVID numbers continue to climb within the state due to the recent introduction of the Omicron/ Delta variants which are highly contagious, the CDC has reduced the number of quarantine days down to 5 for both symptomatic and asymptomatic carriers of the virus.

The change is motivated by science demonstrating that the majority of SARS-CoV-2 transmission occurs early in the course of illness, generally in the 1-2 days prior to onset of symptoms and the 2-3 days after.

The state's biggest problem with keeping numbers down remains not the updated isolation period, but the large number of unvaccinated residents. Currently 68% of the state's total population has received at least one vaccine dose; 93% of seniors are fully vaccinated. The state is approaching 9 million vaccine doses administered, with over 1.8 million of those being booster shots.

The high number of unvaccinated residents in the state has prompted a new executive order to be initiated by Minneapolis Mayor Jacob Frey and St. Paul Mayor Melvin Carter, citing that people

entering establishments serving food or beverages will need to show proof of vaccination or a negative test within 72 hours to enter. The rule will also apply to anyone going to see the Timberwolves at Target Center or the Wild at Xcel Energy Center.

In Minneapolis, the policy will apply to anyone who can be vaccinated, meaning anyone 5 and older. Children between the ages of 2 and 5 will need to show proof of a negative test. Children under 2 will be exempt.

In St. Paul, the rules are slightly different: Children under 5 will be exempt. However, those who are older will need to show proof of vaccination or a negative test.

The policies for both cities will go into effect on Jan. 19, and they'll extend to cover ticketed events on Jan. 26.

This executive order comes a week after both cities reissued their mask mandates for public areas.

Currently most Northern Minnesota cities have not reissued any public mandates despite the climbing number of cases. A look at the numbers as of January 13:

The Minnesota Department of Health says the state's total number of confirmed coronavirus cases is now at 1,126,697. Of them, nearly 1,054,656 no longer require isolation.

The state's death toll is now at 10,939 with 5,219 of those deaths involving cases in long-term care (LTC) facilities.

Health officials say approximately 16,954,490 Minnesotans have been tested for the virus so far including 11,976 on the reservation.

An LLTC staff member who is currently in the middle of this process is Helen Zaikina-Montgomery. Zaikina-Montgomery was the college's only presenting finalist, after her fellow candidates withdrew their applications. She has a longstanding history with the college, first serving two years as the college's Director of Assessment and Institutional Research prior to holding the interim position of president at the college in May 2021. Zaikina-Montgomery has a PHD in experimental psychology and a 20-year background working in higher education.

During Zaikina-Montgomery's 40-minute public presentation, she detailed a 5-year plan built on increasing enrollment, further incorporating cultural programming, staff benefits and student retention. Later answering community questions from those attending in person and via zoom.

If hired, Zaikina-Montgomery will oversee many of the college's day to

Free State Park and Rec Access Granted to All MN Tribal Enrollees

MINNEAPOLIS – All enrolled Minnesota Tribal members now have free access to Minnesota's 75 state park and recreation areas.

The Minnesota DNR worked with the Governor's office and the State Legislature during the 2020 season to change laws so Tribal members can obtain a state park vehicle permit at no charge. The change ensures open access for Tribal members to ancestral lands.

Each of Minnesota's 11 Federally recognized Tribes participated in coordination meetings with DNR staff to determine how Tribal membership is defined, and the kind of identification needed for members to receive a permit.

To receive a state park vehicle permit, Tribal members have a number of ways to self identify for free parking. Tribal members can show Tribal identification at the park office. If the office is closed, self-payment envelopes can be used at the park entrance with "Tribal



Permit" written over the payment section.

Vehicles with a Tribal license plate are also allowed free access without the pass as your license plate signals the driver as an identifiable member of a federally recognized Tribe. Other forms of identification accepted include a certificate of Indian blood or an 1854 Treaty Authority Window Cling or ID Card.

LLBO is working with DNR to have these available at the DRM office in Cass Lake in the near future.



Recipe of the Month by Chyrle LaDuke (Food Distribution), Josh Red Day (Leech Lake Diabetes Program)

gweyakmino wiisinidaa! (Let's eat the right foods!)

Nutritional notes: Starting the new year off we are also going to be focusing on starting our day off right! Breakfast is the most important meal of the day! What's more important is the composition of our breakfasts. So, what would a healthy breakfast be composed of? Take this study for example,

1. Columbia University randomized individuals into one of three breakfast conditions: oatmeal made from quick oats, the same number of calories in Frosted Flakes, or just plain

water. They then measured how many calories people took in at lunch three hours later ... Overweight participants who had eaten oatmeal for breakfast consumed less than half as many calories at lunch, about four hundred fewer calories, which is more than the oatmeal itself had contained. So, in effect, the oatmeal provided "negative" calories.

In our last article (Debahjimon VoL. XXXXVIII No. 6, Dec. 2021) we mentioned that fiber creates

short chain fatty acids, which in turn, helps regulate our appetite. Curbing those cravings later on. It makes sense that oatmeal, which offers an abundance of fiber, would help us feel fuller longer, and therefore tends to reduce our caloric intake later on in the day.

A quick note in oatmeal types, we want to encourage minimally process grains, in the example above they highlight quick oats. Other types of oatmeal like the microwave variety although do offer fiber, when they're processed they often times added unwanted sugars and sodium so be mindful of the variety of oatmeal you're choosing. We would encourage using the "old fashioned" oatmeal if available.

Mark attended Brown Institute in Minneapolis and became a successful disc jockey, opening radio stations across the Midwest. His distinctive on-air presence, endless sense of humor, intelligence and articulate voice allowed him to cross over into acting in television and film, and Mark moved to Southern California. Under the stage name Johnny West, he got his start from legendary comedian Jonathan Winters, and Mark's TV credits include "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," "Barney Miller," and "The Bob Newhart Show." He was a member of the Screen Actors Guild, and the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.

As a savvy, seasoned broadcast journalist, and the older brother of American Indian Movement cofounder Dennis Banks, Mark delivered the true, behind-the-scenes stories of the Wounded Knee occupation of 1973 to the mainstream media, facilitating multicultural understanding, and celebrity support for the Native side of the story. Mark loved to enlighten and educate people on Native issues, and traveled to the United Kingdom, where he spoke in Parliament.

Mark loved singing with a big band, playing basketball, baseball and cribbage, and traveling. Most of all, Mark loved to make people laugh – and he was legendary at it. He is survived by daughters Lori Kuester (Charlie), and January 2022 | Debahjimon

In 2021 Leech Lake Tribal Police Officers executed seventeen (17) drug related search warrants specific to residences and vehicles. Officers seized twelve (12) firearms, consisting of both handguns and long guns. Approximately \$1,672.00 of US cash currency was seized, which investigators believe is tied directly to the sales and distribution of illegal drug sales.

January is National Radon Action Month



Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that can enter your home through cracks in the foundation. Just like air, radon is invisible and has no odor. Radon could be in your home, and you would never suspect it. Radon is a health concern because it is a carcinogen and causes lung cancer. Radon is the 2nd leading cause of lung cancer in the U.S. for people who don't smoke and is responsible for an estimated 21,000 deaths from lung cancer each year. There is no known safe level of radon.

People spend more time indoors now than in the past, so long-term exposure to radon has become more of an issue. Many of us live in houses that are well sealed from the outdoor air. This can lead to high levels of radon in our homes. It doesn't matter what type of home you live in; any home could possibly have a radon issue.

Homes on the Leech Lake Reservation range from low to high levels of radon. To date, we have assisted almost 400 Leech Lake community members in making sure their homes are safe by testing for and reducing radon levels. Testing is the only way to determine radon levels in your home.

All duties will be focused toward the prepa-ration and safety management of all students and staff. The Wellness COVID Coordinator will be the key resource and central point of contact for all mat-ters concerning COVID-19 for the LLTC campus community. In addition, the Coordinator is responsible for implementing all applicable procedures adopted by LLTC in response to the pandemic. Also, the Coordinator is in charge of maintaining workplace safety by limiting potential environmental hazard risks to students, employees, and visitors. The main task is to ensure the LLTC follows safety standards and government regulation, including designing and implementing safety processes and procedures and maintaining documentation and records.
